**Chinese American Citizens Alliance Adopts Health Care Reform Resolution**

At its December 12, 2009, national meeting in San Francisco, the Board of Grand Officers of the Chinese American Citizens Alliance unanimously adopted the following resolution:

**"Be it resolved that because of fundamental problems in the current health care system in America, including access problems, deficits in quality of medical care, and unsustainable cost increases, Chinese American Citizens Alliance endorses and supports health care reform as the best way to remedy these problems plaguing America's broken health care system."**

Considering that health care touches every single American citizen of every demographic identification, Alliance President Carolyn Hong Chan [陳湯美屏] remarked, "The Alliance fully recognizes that the system of care as it has evolved today is not meeting up to the challenges of accessibility, care continuum, quality and affordability. The health care bills still being debated, are a work in progress, and must be reconciled by both Houses before a final bill to be approved by both bodies. On behalf of our members, families and communities, we intend to be part of the dialogue that produces a health care system that works best for every single American."

"The current Alliance membership reflects the general demographic of persons impacted by the state of the health care system today. We are the insured and uninsured, married and single, small and medium sized business owners and employers of private and public corporations. We are among the fully English literate and the non-English speaking and those knowledgeable about accessing health care and those with great fear in seeking needed attention. We are wealthy and poor and all in between, many highly educated and some functionally illiterate, and those who seek preventive care and those who seek only post diagnostic measures. We use Western medical diagnosis and treatment and we also consider alternative measures. It is for all these people that we must bring the stimulus for fundamental change. We are the patient, but we are also the cure for the system," emphasized Chan.

## C.A.C.A. Scholarship Opportunities

### ***Fred G. Lee Memorial Scholarship Evolves***

For over 30 years the Portland Lodge of the C.A.C.A. has sponsored the Fred G. Lee Memorial Scholarship for qualified Oregon and Clark County of Washington State graduating high school senior students. This scholarship is awarded to graduating senior students on the merits of academics, leadership, and community involvement. The winner receives a \$4000.00 scholarship and two runner-up amounts are for \$1000.00 each. Applications for this scholarship are due by April 1, 2010.

This year there are several changes with the scholarship. All applicants must have a parent/guardian who is a member of the C.A.C.A. Portland Lodge. Chinese Ancestry is not a requirement to be a member, and applications are available at [www.cacaportland.org](http://www.cacaportland.org). At least one of the three scholarships will be awarded to a student who attends a college in Oregon or Washington State.

### ***Essay Contest***

Each year the Grand Lodge and our local lodge sponsors an essay contest. The goal of this contest is to build leadership skills for young community leaders of tomorrow by encouraging good English writing skills, and demonstrating the ability to present clear, logical thinking on an issue of current national relevance. Applicants are expected to write a 500-word English theme within two hours, on a topic given at the beginning of the contest. Judging is conducted by a national board of judges organized by the Grand Lodge of the C.A.C.A. The essays are evaluated for originality, clarity of thought and expression, and correctness of grammar and spelling. This contest is open to qualified Oregon and Clark County of Washington State high school students (grades 9-12).

### ***Tiffany Wang Arts Scholarship***

Two students will be selected to each receive \$500 towards a summer arts program. These arts scholarships are offered for (1) pre-college student (grades 9-11) who are interested in attending a summer arts program, (2) demonstrate financial need, and (3) talent in the fine or performing arts. This scholarship is for qualified Oregon and Clark County of Washington State high school students (grades 9-11).

## **Basketball Program to Begin New Season**

C.A.C.A. basketball teams have started games for the 2010 season. This season marks the program's 36th year. The mission of the Basketball is to help develop the participants into leaders and outstanding citizens within the community. We provide the opportunity for the players to interact and have fun with fellow players and adult volunteers and to follow the C.A.C.A. Basketball Program Code of Conduct. Indeed, many of our new assistant coaches are just a few years removed from having played in the program themselves and are now giving back to the program by coaching and teaching current participants.

The program participates in the Portland Parks and Recreational District Saturday Youth Basketball League (SYBL). The SYBL consists of 5<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade boys and girls teams. The games and practices are held at Portland Public Schools middle and grade schools. There are a total of ten games played on Saturdays in January through March, with no playoffs. The games follow the official National Federation of State High School Association rules, with modifications for 6<sup>th</sup> grade and under. Practices started in late November and the last game will be in mid-March. At the end of the regular season, the C.A.C.A. Basketball Tournament will be held at Oregon City High School on March 27 and 28. The week prior, C.A.C.A. will participate in the SCAA Al Mar Invitational, which will be held in Seattle. Competition between Portland and Seattle has created over 30 years of long lasting friendships.

This year, we welcome back the following coaches with the following teams: Rex Wong (8<sup>th</sup> Grade Boys, Tsunami), Thomas Phuong (High School Girls, Illicit), Bryant Dong (11<sup>th</sup>/12<sup>th</sup> Grade Boys, Rebels), Stephan Tran (11<sup>th</sup>/12<sup>th</sup> Grade Boys, Hornets), Shawn Saysensesouk (11<sup>th</sup>/12<sup>th</sup> Grade Boys, Warriors. Additionally, the C.A.C.A. Dragons (two-time defending C.A.C.A. Champions) will be fielding two teams this season. 9<sup>th</sup>/10<sup>th</sup> Grade Boys coached by David Green. And 11<sup>th</sup>/12<sup>th</sup> Grade Boys coached by Cyrus Lee.

The season started off in historic fashion as the two longest running teams in the Program faced off against each other on January 16<sup>th</sup>. The 11<sup>th</sup>/12<sup>th</sup> Dragons (13<sup>th</sup> consecutive year in program) hosted the 11<sup>th</sup>/12<sup>th</sup> Rebels (14<sup>th</sup> consecutive year in program) at St. Johns Community Center. Both teams won their opening games the week before. The first half was close as the Rebels stayed with the Dragons and trailed 21-18 at the half. The Dragons then increased the defensive pressure and only allowed the Rebels to score one point in a decisive third quarter which saw the lead push out to double digits. The Dragons won 41-28 in front of a large audience of C.A.C.A. Basketball supporters.

Randall Choy and Cyrus Lee will coordinate the program for this season and continue to evaluate the program and look for opportunities to add value to all stakeholders: our coaches and other volunteers, C.A.C.A. Portland Lodge and the surrounding community, and the youth participants themselves. This is truly an exciting time to be part of the basketball program!

Players can either register individually or as a team. The cost for high school players averages to be around \$65.00 (fees are assessed to an entire team at the rate of \$620.00), and for middle school and younger players around \$50.00. Practices start in late November.

**NEWS FROM PAST SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT— Ellen Wang (Class of 2008):**

The first year of college was both an adventure and a juggling act. Besides adjusting to the rigorous academics, I struggled to find what clubs I should join and figure out which groups I fit into. After much trial and error, I found the West Philadelphia Tutoring Project and quickly got involved. It seemed like the perfect calling; even before I had come to Penn I was determined, in what small way I could, to help the West Philadelphia community. During my first year, I tutored a fifth grade student once a week and had the great opportunity to meet with his mother before and after each of our tutoring sessions. But while I enjoyed having a relationship with both the tutee and his parents, I tutored my student on campus and never truly got the full scope of the inner-city school dynamics. This year, I joined the project's executive board and have a much more involved role. Each board member is responsible for overseeing tutoring at one public school in the Philadelphia School District that we drive to and tutor at once a week with a group of Penn students. Just being in a West Philly school is an eye-opening experience, and you find that many stereotypes of "the ghetto" are real. Even the drive over makes you realize the magnitude of problems in urban areas such as these and the triviality of the ones present in the small and protected suburb I come from. I love being a part of this organization and look forward to three more years of being on the board.

This year, I also took a position on the Dean's Advisory Board, a group consisting of around fifteen students from the College of Arts and Sciences working towards improving areas of the College through initiatives such as developing new minors. We work closely with the dean and administration to make sure our ideas can be followed through. Because Penn is such a pre-professional school, I feel as though the College loses a bit of its identity due to its liberal arts direction. Being on the DAB gives me a voice and the ability to make changes that both my peers and I feel need to be made. Currently, I am on the committee working towards organizing a departmental research fair that will better expose the many undergraduate research opportunities offered here at Penn.

I am savoring every moment of my experience here at Penn, and I'd like to thank the CACA for its continued investment in my education. The more time I spend away from home, the more I appreciate all my sources of support.



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
